
# Another Country presents new designs by Aaron Probyn and David Irwin at London Design Festival




The Slow sofa designed by Aaron Probyn for Another Country

Welcoming Aaron Probyn to its roster of designers, British furniture brand Another Country will launch the Syd chair and the Slow sofa this September, along with the Davenport Bureau by long-standing collaborator David Irwin.

Aaron Probyn explains: "The name Slow came from the profile of the sofa resembling a tortoise, and is a metaphor for what many of us are looking for in a sofa. In recent years, we have seen a movement towards slower living and being mindful about our wellbeing and the planet we occupy. With our lives being overtaken by technology and in general becoming more mentally demanding, the sofa is one of the few places where you can carve some time out for yourself".

The London and New York based designer also sought to address his frustration at not being able to move easily in the city. Aaron Probyn elaborates: "In New York, as in many metropolitan cities, spaces are becoming smaller and access is tighter. The seat section neatly fixes into place allowing a larger deep sofa, so that you don't have to compromise on comfort or generosity. The thin outer frame is also visually light and the feet give the appearance of it floating."

Drawing inspiration from Luis Barragàn's pared-back aesthetic, the Syd chair evokes the subtle balance of hard lines, weight and lightness characteristic of the celebrated Mexican architect's work. Originally prototyped by Aaron, the chair was brought to a local wood turner in New York.

Aaron Probyn comments: "The starting point for the Syd chair was my longstanding fascination with the furniture Luis Barragàn selected for his own home in Mexico City – it brought a sense of calmness and pragmatism to the space. The interior of Casa Luis Barragàn drove both the choices in shape and material palette: a pale wood and vegetable-tanned leather that would patina and become richer with time."

Another Country's founder Paul de Zwart has invited David Irwin to design an intriguing new piece for the brand's furniture collection. The Davenport Bureau was designed with working-from-home in mind.

David Irwin comments: "Working from home will continue in some capacity for most use so it is important to create separation between work and home life and have a dedicated work space which can be easily tidied away. To achieve this, the fold down element of traditional bureaus has been adopted but without the angled front, so it's not immediately obvious it's a desk. When closed it appears as a cabinet, helping to remove the visual reminder of work when wanting to switch off. The straight sides also create more of an enclosure with the aim of aiding focus while working".

With a focus on quality of materials, the proportions of the Davenport Bureau are also generous, providing ample desk space and storage while allowing a computer monitor to fit in the main opening.

The Slow sofa, Syd chair and Davenport Bureau are available both in-store and online. Another Country's showroom is located in Marylebone at 18 Crawford St, London W1H 1BT.
