





THE MAKERS' MARKET AT THE ROYAL EXCHANGE

LONDON DESIGN FESTIVAL, SEPTEMBER 2021



The Royal Exchange, the beautiful, historic building at the heart of the City and home to some of the world's most coveted luxury brands, is celebrating its 450th anniversary throughout 2021.

This September, for London Design Festival and in celebration of the building's milestone anniversary, The Royal Exchange will host *The Makers' Market*, a platform for design-led brands and makers to exhibit and sell unique, handcrafted products in a specially created pop-up space on the mezzanine level inside the grand courtyard of the landmark building.

Throughout its extraordinary history, The Royal Exchange has seen many different uses since it was founded in 1566 by merchant Sir Thomas Gresham and officially opened on 23 January 1571 by Queen Elizabeth I, who awarded the building its royal title and a licence to sell alcohol and valuable goods. Overnight, the shops developed a cachet by association with royalty and there was a clamour for units and The Royal Exchange became a fashionable destination for its apothecaries, booksellers, printers, grocers, barber/surgeons, leather-sellers, goldsmiths, vintners, glass-sellers and milliners (which in Gresham's era also sold 'mousetraps, birdcages,

lanthorns [lanterns], trumps [mouth harps] and shoeing-horns'. Two milliners had the equivalent of a Royal Warrant to supply the Queen, adding to the allure of this proto-shopping mall. Soon there were more than I8O units on the Pawn (the upper storeys), mostly just I.5 metres (5ft) wide by 2.3 meters deep (7.5ft), bringing in a healthy income.

Taking inspiration from its history as one of the first specialist commercial centres in the world, *The Makers' Market at The Royal Exchange* will display new, unique work from a wide range of creative disciplines. All the products will be handmade and handcrafted in the UK, using craftsmanship techniques and classical materials including textiles, leather, ceramic and wood, many of which will be used in new and innovative ways. This is in reference to the original merchants and craftspeople who have traded at The Royal Exchange throughout its history.

All products will be available to purchase from The Royal Exchange during London Design Festival.

Officially opened by HRH Queen Elizabeth I in 1571, The Royal Exchange was the brainchild of renowned merchant Thomas Gresham. It soon became a centre for the capital's commerce, bringing together both brokers and merchants. Trading continued for the next four centuries, despite being interrupted by fires, war and construction work, before coming to a halt in 1991. Then in 2001, an extensive redevelopment by architects Aukett Fitzroy Robinson transformed The

Royal Exchange courtyard, reviving its trading legacy by giving it a new role housing the world's most desired retailers and placing it, once again, in the thriving centre of commerce.

Traditionally, the steps of the Royal Exchange are the place where certain royal proclamations are read out by either a herald or a crier.
