

THE DAVID COLLINS FOUNDATION PRESENTS CONVERGENCE AN EXHIBITION CURATED BY ELLEN E. JONES FOR LONDON DESIGN FESTIVAL 2025

<u>The David Collins Foundation</u> was created in 2016 to commemorate the late David Collins, his work, his passion for the arts, his love of beauty, and his ever-curious mindset for all things innovative and new. Through its partnership with <u>The Arts Foundation</u>, The Foundation has supported talented artists and designers across a range of artistic mediums, allowing them space to focus on the development of their practice since 2017.


The exhibition, *Convergence*, curated by broadcaster, author and journalist <u>Ellen E. Jones</u> celebrates the work of eleven artists supported through this partnership between the two foundations. Taking place in the fortieth year of David Collins Studio, the exhibition also reflects on the enduring influence of Collins' creative vision and his commitment to nurturing talent.

The exhibition features a multi-media presentation by artists Ayo Akingbade and Savinder Bual, designers Aura Murillo, Louise Lenborg Skajem and Jochen Holz, Max Frommeld and TK Hay, poets Ella Frears and Will Harris, and filmmakers Cherish Oteka and Onyeka Igwe.

The works presented showcase a broad spectrum of contemporary arts practice and Jones's curation creates a dialogue across generations and disciplines, reflecting on legacy while drawing out the connections and creative possibilities between the works in the present.

Convergence has been designed by the London-based studio <u>Bibliothèque Design</u> and will be held at <u>The Lavery</u>, South Kensington, as part of London Design Festival 2025 and Brompton Design District.

Exhibition curator Ellen E. Jones says "I see my role as curator as something akin to a host or facilitator, entrusted with helping to bring together a group of extraordinary guests for a moment of shared connection. In this imagined gathering, the guests are the works themselves, each one representing an artist the late David Collins once met, admired, and was moved by. My hope is to arrange them so that a conversation begins to take place, until the room feels alive with connection."

Since 1993, the Arts Foundation has awarded over £2 million to the most promising artists in the UK at a pivotal moment in their careers to enable them to concentrate on their creative development, experiment, and realise their artistic potential.

Historically, the annual Arts Foundation Futures Awards has provided five transformative £10,000 Fellowships, with all Shortlisted Artists receiving £1,000 towards the development of their practice. In 2025, the Arts Foundation announced that it had raised the Fellowship Award amount to £20,000 to ensure it continues to have the same life-changing impact, responds to inflation, the ongoing cost of living crisis and low artist income precarity experienced across the contemporary arts in the UK.

Onyeka Igwe is an artist and researcher specialising in moving image. Her practice figures sensorial, spatial and counter-hegemonic ways of knowing. Recent solo exhibitions include at Peer, London; (2024); MoMA PS1, New York (2023); Highline, New York (2022); LUX, London; (2021) and Jerwood Arts, London (2019). Recent group exhibitions have been held at Walker Art Gallery, Liverpool; Nigeria Pavilion, La Biennale di Venezia, Venice; Lagos Biennial, Lagos (2024); The Common Guild, Glasgow and South London Gallery, London; (2023). Igwe's works are part of the British Film Institute Collection and The Arts Council Collection (UK).
